Local Area Unemployment Statistics

- The state's unemployment rate was back to 3.5% in October 2021
 - Peaked at 11.3% in May 2020 (highest on record back to 1976)
- Back to 106,415 unemployed workers in Oct. 2021
 - Down from a peak of 348,262 workers in May 2020
 - Up from 103,568 unemp. workers in Feb. 2020
- Back up to 3,032,807 available workers in Oct. 2021
 - Down from a peak of 3,178,494 workers in June 2020
 - Down -84,274 workers from Feb. 2020
- Labor Force Participation Rate is 67.8%
 - Down from 70.2% in Feb. 2020

Labor Force Projections

- The state's labor force growth has slowed down
 - From an average of more than 41,000 new workers per year (1990s)
 - To an average of 15,500 new workers per year (2010s)
- Projected to slow down to about 8,600 new workers per year over the next decade
 - Immigrants accounted for nearly half of labor force growth from 2010-2019
 - Almost all of the state's labor force growth is projected to occur in the Twin Cities metro area (+6.0%)
 - Central = +0.6%
 - Southeast = -0.9%
 - Northwest = -1.0%
 - Northeast = -4.9%
 - Southwest = -5.2%



Labor Force Participation


- The number of workers aged 55 years & over increased from 350,342 in 2000 to 734,657 in 2019 (+384,315 workers; +109.7%)
 - Workers 55 years & over accounted for 13.0% of the total labor force in 2000
 - Workers 55 years & over now account for 23.6% of the total labor force in 2019
- Labor force participation rates were climbing for older workers
 - From 22.7% for workers aged 65-74 in 2000 to 28.1% in 2019
 - From 6.0% for workers aged 75 & over in 2000 to 7.0% in 2019
- Pandemic recession may have changed that!

- New RECORD high!
- Up +95,000 vacs. from Q2 2020
- Up +80,000 vacs. from Q4 2020
- Previous high was 146,500 vacs.
 in the 2nd Qtr. of 2019
- Job Vacancy Rate of 8.0%
 - 8 unfilled jobs for every 100 filled jobs
 - Highest rate on record!
- 0.6 job seekers per vacancy
 - Up to 2.7 in Qtr. 2 2020
 - Back to pre-pandemic levels
 - 3 straight years
- Around 8.0 job seekers per vacancy during the Great Recession



Figure 2. Minnesota Job Vacancies by Industry Sector, Second Quarter 2021




Several industries set new record high levels of job vacancies in the second quarter of 2021:

- Health Care & Social Assistance 39,727 vacancies
- Accommodation & Food Services 37,363 vacancies
- Retail Trade 36,174 vacancies
- Manufacturing 14,621 vacancies
- Transportation & Warehousing 11,346 vacancies
- Educational Services 9,046 vacancies
- Construction 9,007 vacancies
- Professional & Technical Services 8,450 vacancies
- Arts, Entertainment & Recreation 6,590 vacancies
- Other Services 6,336 vacancies
- Finance & Insurance 5,360 vacancies
- Utilities 307 vacancies

- Food Prep & Serving = 35,206 vacs (+163%)
 - 49% part-time, \$13.04 wage offer (+7.2%)
- Sales & Related = 26,484 vacs. (+84.0%)
 - 30% part-time; \$14.32 (-3.2%)
- Healthcare Support = 17,169 vacs. (+32.5%)
 - 56% part-time; \$13.92 offer (+0.1%)
- Transportation & Matl. Moving = 14,271 vacs. (+67%)
 - 66% req. cert. or license; \$15.78 offer
- Healthcare Practitioners & Tech.
 - = 13,859 vacs. (+46.3%); \$27.51
- Office & Admin. Support = 12,250 vacs. (+78.5%)
 - 36% part-time; \$15.06 (-0.1%)
- Production = 9,175 vacs. (+203%)
 - 21% req. postsec. educ., \$17.08 offer



- Home Health & Personal Care Aides = 9,259 vacs. (\$13.34)
- Retail Salespersons = 8,839 vacs. (\$12.64)
- First-line Supervisors of Retail Sales Workers = 6,988 vacs. (\$16.00)
- First-line Supervisors of Food Prep & Serving Workers= 6,631 vacs. (\$15.83)
- Nursing Assistants = 6,001 vacs. (\$15.49)
- Cashiers = 4,897 vacs. (\$12.26)
- Registered Nurses = 4,782 vacs. (\$31.86)
- Janitors & Cleaners = 3,825 vacs. (\$18.53)
- Waiters & Waitresses = 3,552 vacs. (\$10.89)
- Customer Service Representatives = 3,346 vacs. (\$13.60)
- Stockers & Order Fillers = 3,237 vacs. (\$13.21)

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
- The median (50th percentile) wage offer for all job vacancies rose to \$16.64 per hour
- Wage offers are highly correlated with experience and education requirements
- Median wage offer is up 4.3% from 2020, showing that employers are raising wages to attract workers
- Wage offers increased faster than average for lower-paying occupations including a 20.5% increase for Building & Grounds Cleaning & Maintenance workers, a 14.3% increase for Transportation & Material Moving workers, an 11% increase for Farming, Fishing, & Forestry workers, and a 7.2% increase for Food Prep & Serving Related workers

Figure 3. Minnesota Job Vacancies by Education and Experience Required with Wage Offers, Second Quarter 2021



- In Minnesota, most hiring demand is in medium sized businesses!
 - Small businesses offer 19% of total openings
 - Second highest wage offers (\$17.34), least likely to offer healthcare benefits (50%)
 - Medium businesses offer 40% of total openings
 - Lowest median wage offers (\$15.15), second least likely to offer healthcare (53%), least likely to require postsecondary education (24%)
 - Large business offer 26% of total openings
 - Second lowest median wage offers (\$16.53), most likely to offer healthcare benefits
 - Very Large businesses offer 15% of total openings
 - Highest median wage offers (\$21.59), highest postsecondary requirements (49%) and are second most likely to offer healthcare benefits (60%)



- Vacancies doubled in 3 of the 6 regions
 - SE = +123%, Central = +105%, NE = +102%
- 5 of 6 regions set new record highs
 - SE has the most severe shortage (0.5-to-1)
- Wage offers were up in 4 of the 6 regions
 - Only SW and NE saw declines
- The percent of part-time openings declined in 5 of 6 regions
 - Only NE saw an increase in part-time

- Twin Cities (119,505 vacancies; +53,626 vacancies; +81.4%); *Median wage offer of \$17.86*
 - Most vacancies in Health Care & Social Assistance (23,067 vacs.), Accommodation & Food Services (21,400 vacs.), Retail Trade (18,624 vacs.), and Manufacturing (8,429 vacs.)
- Southeast (21,510 vacancies; +11,887 vacancies; +123.5%); Median wage offer of \$16.01
 - Most vacancies in Retail Trade (4,930 vacs.), Health Care & Social Assistance (3,834 vacs.), and Accommodation & Food Services (3,627 vacs.)
- Central (21,935 vacancies; +11,208 vacancies; +104.5%); *Median wage offer of \$15.28*
 - Most vacancies in Accommodation & Food Services (4,583 vacs.) and Retail Trade (4,287 vacs.)
- Northeast (12,886 vacancies; +6,502 vacancies; +101.8%); *Median wage offer of \$14.20*
 - Most vacancies in Health Care & Social Assistance (4,551 vacs.)
- Southwest (12,116 vacancies; +5,156 vacancies; +74.1%); *Median wage offer of \$15.03*
 - Most vacancies in Retail Trade (2,597 vacs.), Health Care & Social Assistance (2,259 vacs.), Accom. & Food Services (1,644 vacs.), and Manufacturing (1,161 vacs.)
- Northwest (17,762 vacancies; +5,582 vacancies; +45.8%); *Median wage offer of \$15.13*
 - Most vacancies in Retail Trade (3,992 vacs.), Accom. & Food Services (3,883 vacs.), and Health Care & Social Assistance (3,066 vacs.)

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
