Legal Basis

WIOA Section 188, 29 CFR 38.9

An individual must not be excluded from participation in, denied the benefits of, or otherwise subjected to discrimination under any WIOA Title I-financially assisted program or activity based on national origin.

Why Language Access is Critical to Minnesota's Economy

- Between 2010 and 2020, Minnesota welcomed more than 100,000 new foreign-born residents, including nearly 55,000 new immigrants from Africa.
- Over the past decade, the state added just over 80,000 immigrant workers to the labor force.
- Between 2010-2018 immigrants and refugees accounted for nearly 60% of MN's labor force.
- According to DEED's most recent employment projections, Minnesota is expected to add about 150,000 new jobs through 2028.

Minnesota is Becoming More Diverse

Immigrant and Refugee Minnesotans

- Nearly half million immigrants (484,192 people) call Minnesota home.
- In 2018, 9% of Minnesotans were foreign-born. 18% of children in Minnesota are either a child of an immigrant or were themselves born in a different country.
- 51% of Minnesota's foreign-born population are naturalized U.S. citizens.

National Origin & Language Access Discrimination

Recipients must not discriminate based on national origin against individuals who are LEP.

Doing so could result in a charge of discrimination

National Original Discrimination

Treating anyone adversely because they are from a particular country or part of the world, because of ethnicity or accent, or because the recipient perceives the individual to be of a certain national origin, even if they are not.




Limited English Proficiency Data

29 CFR 38.41(2) Collection and maintenance of equal opportunity data and other information.

...Beginning on January 3, 2019, each recipient must also record the limited English proficiency and preferred language of each applicant, registrant, participant, and terminee...

Types of Language Assistance

Interpretation is an ORAL language assistance service



 Translation is WRITTEN language assistance service




What's required by recipients of federal funds?

Must take reasonable steps to ensure meaningful access to each limited English proficiency (LEP) individual served or encountered so that LEP individuals are effectively informed about and/or able to participate in the program or activity.

Recommended Model for Providing Meaningful access to LEP individuals

- 1. Conduct a self-assessment to determine what types of contact your agency has with LEP populations.
- 2. Develop language access policy directives.
- 3. Develop a language access implementation plan.



Reasonable Steps 1

- 1. An assessment of an LEP individual to determine language assistance needs
- 2. Providing oral interpretation or written translation of both hard copy and electronic materials in the appropriate non-English language to LEP individuals
- 3. Outreach to LEP communities to improve service delivery in needed languages.

Reasonable Steps 2

- Any language assistance services must be accurate, provided in a timely manner and free of charge.
- A recipient must provide adequate notice to LEP individuals of the existence of interpretation and translation services and that these language assistance services are free of charge
- A recipient can not require an LEP individual to provide their own interpreter or to rely on a minor child or adult family or friend(s) to facilitate communication.

Reasonable Steps - Vital Information

• Recipients must translate vital information in written materials into languages when a <u>significant number</u> or portion of the population eligible to be served or likely to be encountered in those languages.

Reasonable Steps – Babel Notice

• Recipients must include a "Babel notice" indicating in appropriate languages that language assistance is available such as hard copy letters or decisions or communications posted on Web sites.
