Minnesota Human Services Department Transition Overview

On May 23, 2023, Gov. Tim Walz signed into law two pieces of legislation that will bring big changes to the Department of Human Services (DHS), paving the way for the creation of a new Department of Children, Youth, and Families (DCYF) and establishing Direct Care and Treatment (DCT) as a standalone agency. The Minnesota Legislature gave authority and resources to support the creation of these two new agencies.

This document outlines the programs at each of the agencies, approximate budgets and estimates for staffing.

Department of Human Services

The resulting Minnesota Department of Human Services (DHS) will be smaller and refocused on fewer program areas once colleagues leave the department to create the Minnesota Department of Children, Youth, and Families and the Department of Direct Care and Treatment.

Number of employees: Approximately 2,150 (precise post-transition full-time employee (FTE) numbers are not known yet; this is an estimate).

Budget size: Approximately \$23 billion annually, ongoing.

Department of Children, Youth, and Families

The Department of Children, Youth, and Families will launch July 2024, and be fully staffed in July 2025. Families and those who work with them are asking for coordination, engagement, and culturally and individually responsive programs that meet their children's needs throughout their development. The Department of Children, Youth, and Families will provide a recognizable public face and a clear front-door in the state's quest to prioritize children, youth, and families. This will align communication related to services for families, maximize and coordinate funding, align outcomes, and convene leadership to improve access to services for children, youth, and families.

Number of employees: Approximately 900 (precise post-transition full-time employee (FTE) numbers are not known yet; this is an estimate).

Budget size: Approximately \$20.3 million for FY24-25 transition year; approximately \$3.4 billion annually ongoing.

Department of Direct Care and Treatment

Direct Care and Treatment is a highly specialized behavioral health care system that serves people with mental illnesses, substance use disorders, and developmental and intellectual disabilities. Because their conditions are complex and challenging to treat, other health care providers cannot or will not serve these patients.

The system includes psychiatric hospitals and other inpatient mental health treatment facilities; inpatient substance use treatment facilities; special care dental clinics; outpatient services; crisis services; group homes and vocational sites; and sex offender treatment facilities. In all, DCT delivers these services at about 150 sites statewide.

Number of employees: Approximately 4,700 (precise post-transition full-time employee (FTE) numbers are not known yet; this is an estimate).

Budget size: Approximately \$7.8 million for FY24-25 transition year; approximately \$750 million annually ongoing.
